### News Release of Meeting

Chairperson Christine Sharp called the meeting to order and Commissioner Eva Ravenel read a statement of announcement about the meeting that was mailed to the appropriate media, interested persons, and posted at the Central Office and on the website in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act.

### Invocation

Chairperson Christine Sharpl gave the invocation.

### Adoption of the Agenda

Commissioner Bill Danielson made the motion to change the order of the agenda items to allow flexibility. The motion was seconded and passed. The Commission adopted the January 15, 2015 Meeting Agenda with the changes. (Attachment A)

### Approval of the Minutes of the December 18, 2014 Commission Meetings

The Commission approved the November 20, 2014 Commission Meeting minutes with a change by unanimous consent.

### Public Input

Ms. Judy Johnson, Executive Director of the Babcock Center, spoke on behalf of the SC Human Service Providers Association.

### Commissioners' Update

There were no updates.

### Pervasive Developmental Disorder Program Evaluation Update

Mrs. Susan Beck introduced Mr. John Kuntz with the University of South Carolina that conducted the PDD Program evaluation. Mr. Kuntz gave a detailed update which included the evaluation objectives and how children who participate in the PDD program achieve significant improvements in their adaptive behaviors and language skills. The evaluation update will be posted on the agency website. (Attachment B)

### Onetime Use of Recurring Funding for Autism Services

Mr. Tom Waring stated that DDSN was appropriated onetime funds of \$1,150,000 for autism services for current fiscal year. DDSN submitted a solicitation to the provider network and advocacy agencies for proposals on increasing service capacity for autism services. The agency received an overwhelming response of 57 proposals totaling over \$10 Million. Mr. Waring

requested the Commission's approval to add \$850,000 to the \$1.15 million to meet this overwhelming response. Dr. Buscemi stated the \$850,000.00 is projected to be carried forward this year. These are funds that can be used directly related to service expansion. On motion of Commissioner Ravenel, seconded and passed, the Commission approved adding \$850,000 to the appropriated onetime funding of \$1.15 million for a total of \$2,000,000 to fund the unexpected volume of initiatives.

#### Silver Palmetto Award

Ms. Lois Park Mole presented information on the 2014 Silver Palmetto Award that is given annually to a city or town in South Carolina that has best demonstrated exceptional support and commitment to the people we serve during the previous year. It was recommended that the City of Aiken be awarded the 2014 Silver Palmetto Award for their outstanding leadership in building successful partnerships between people with and without disabilities. On motion of Commissioner Bill Danielson, seconded and passed, the Commission approved that the City of Aiken receive the 2013 Palmetto Award for partnering with the Tri-Development Center in giving employment opportunities to people with disabilities. Chairperson Christine Sharp will present the award at the Municipal Association of SC in Columbia, SC on February 4, 2015.

### Therap Implementation

Mr. David Foshee gave an update on the Therap, an electronic health record and consumer data system. Phase 1 implementation which includes all consumers receiving day and residential in the community and in regional centers will begin on April 1, 2015. Phase 2 which includes all other individuals in the system and CDSS will no longer be the system of record will be implemented November 30, 2015. Phase 3 which replaces DDSN's Medicaid billing, personnel and reporting system and any other functions not included in Phase 1 and 2 will be implemented June 30, 2016. Mr. Foshee also spoke of the upcoming training opportunities.

### Waiting List Progress Report

Mrs. Susan Beck gave a detailed update on the Intellectual Disabilities/Related Disabilities, Community Supports and the Head and Spinal Cord Waiting Lists and the Pervasive Developmental Disorder Program. She stated that we are making a lot of progress with enrollments. (Attachment C)

### **Budget Update**

Mr. Tom Waring gave a detailed update on the nine budget priorities for 2016 in regards to the Governor's Executive Budget. DDSN requested \$21.8 million to continue moving the waiting lists and other initiatives. The Governor provided \$12.5 million in her Executive Budget for the disabilities population.

This is at a great start for the 2016 budget process. The Governor was very generous to the department's service needs for the disability population. Included in the Executive Budget was a proviso that requires DDSN to implement a permanent match transfer to DHHS that does not interrupt DDSN's business operations; this proviso was discussed. Mr. Waring stated that Dr. Buscemi will present DDSN's budget to the House Ways & Means Healthcare Budget Subcommittee on Tuesday, January 27, 2015.

### Next Regular Meeting Date

Chairperson Christine Sharp announced the next regular Commission Meeting is scheduled for Thursday, February 19, 2015 with the starting time to be determined. The meeting will be held at the DDSN Central Office.

### **ABA Overview**

- Individualized goals are developed, such as eliminating challenging behaviors, developing communication skills (speech), training activities of daily living.
- Complex tasks are broken down into small steps.
- Positive reinforcement and extensive support are provided by the therapist.
- Discrete trial training: Each step is practiced over and over until mastery is achieved.
- Intensive in-home or center-based training is provided by a therapist between 20 to 40 hours per week.

## **Evaluation Objectives**

- Objective 1: Evaluate the impact of EIBI on child outcomes (adaptive functioning, verbal ability).
- Objective 2: Assess whether child-specific factors are associated with differences in treatment outcomes.
- Objective 3: Explore the relationship between the changes in adaptive behaviors through time and the actual treatment hours received.





# DOES THE NUMBER OF TREATMENT HOURS RECEIVED AFFECT OUTCOMES?



# Significant Change in Adaptive Behavioral Composite (ABC) Comparison of Treatment Hours



### **Gains in Adaptive Behavior**

- Older children tended to improve less than younger children during the second year
- · Boys and girls show similar improvement
- Children with lower baseline ABC scores improved more than children with higher ABC scores
- Children with lower baseline language performance assessments (PPVT, EVT) improved less than those with higher baseline scores on these assessments

# Are children in the PDD program improving? Yes!

- Children who participate in the PDD Program achieve significant improvements in their adaptive behaviors and language skills.
- These improvements were significantly greater during the first year of the program than the second year.
- Child age, level of functioning at entry, and treatment hours may influence child outcomes.

- Between 700 and 750 people are already enrolled in a DDSN-operated Medicaid waiver.
- Of the approximately 5,100 individuals not enrolled in a DDSN-operated Medicaid waiver, about 60% (3,100) are under age 21.
  - BabyNet services are available from birth to age three and then school services are available up to age 22.
  - Medicaid eligible children are eligible to receive State Plan Medicaid services such as prescriptions, PCA, nursing, incontinence supplies, dental, vision, medically necessary durable medical equipment services, etc. These are the same Medicaid services available to them if they were in the ID/RD waiver.
