News Release of Meeting

Chairperson Danielson called the meeting to order and Commissioner Lemel read a statement of announcement about the meeting that was mailed to the appropriate media, interested persons, and posted at the Central Office and on the website in accordance with the Freedom of Information Act.

Adoption of the Agenda

The Commission adopted the December 15, 2016 Meeting Agenda by unanimous consent. (Attachment A)

Invocation

Commissioner Ravenel gave the invocation.

Approval of the Minutes of the November 17, 2016 Commission Meetings

The Commission approved the November 17, 2016 Commission Meeting minutes by unanimous consent.

Public Input

The following individuals spoke during Public Input: Ms. Carolyn O'Connell, Mr. Mike Bell, Mr. Bob Jones, and Ms. Deborah McPherson.

Commissioners' Update

Commissioners Thompson and Ravenel spoke of events in their districts.

State Director's Report

Dr. Buscemi reported on the following:

Service Authorization/Plan Review Changes – While this proposed change is addressing an operational conflict this step does not make South Carolina nor the DDSN system compliant with the CMS expectations of Conflict Free Case Management (CFCM) as further changes will need to be made. DHHS is forming a workgroup specifically to address CFCM. DDSN and our providers have been invited to participate and added if anyone is interested in participating, to please contact Cassidy Evans with DHHS.

HCBS Final Rule – The Public Consulting Group was awarded the RFP issued by DHHS to conduct site visits and assessments for compliance with expectations of the new rule specific to the DDSN system. Site reviews are expected to begin in March 2017 and to be completed by the end of the calendar year. All DDSN day program locations and residential settings will be

reviewed. All DDSN day programs will be reviewed under heighten scrutiny criteria.

Potential Changes to the South Carolina Statewide ANE Process – DDSN has agreed to lead this effort in response to the recommendations to the SIG report. The kickoff meeting occurred in November with Pat Maley in attendance. The meeting was very productive. The next meeting is scheduled for late January; however, in the meantime, some of the agencies are communicating and sharing information regarding the ANE process.

Legislation – Senator John Scott has again introduced a bill that would place DDSN as a cabinet agency with the director appointed by the Governor and the Commission serving in an advisory capacity rather than a governance capacity.

Public Reporting of Provider Data – Presentation meetings with providers and advocates were held the first week of December. The implementation is scheduled for January with closed website access for providers to review data accuracy in advance of publishing. This implementation will assist with communications about individual provider performance with stakeholders and members of the General Assembly.

Intake – Decentralizing of this service went live on December 1st. There are 263 staff trained and certified with 340 staff enrolled in the learning management system as of yesterday. There are a total of 93 Intake providers.

Autism State Plan- DDSN is still expecting a July 1st timeline. DDSN will be the operating entity and will be paid by DHHS to provide this function. DHHS issued a bulletin stating all RBT line therapists will need to be registered technicians as of July 1st when the program goes into effect. DDSN has several projects with providers who offer this training free of charge.

ABA Courses – Will have a new cohort starting January 2017. This will be a two-year long path and we should be able to accept about 25 people. The classes will be offered in the evening and through distance delivery.

CMS Meeting – Dr. Buscemi has been invited to attend a meeting with CMS staff to discuss various issues and components related to the Final Rule, other CMS initiatives and the transition to a new administration.

Policy Committee Update

Committee Chairman Ravenel gave an update of the Policy Committee meeting that was held prior to the Commission meeting. She stated there was discussion regarding provider oversight, the \$200,000 limit the State Director can approve relating to the entire life of a project. Discussion followed. Commissioner Ravenel motioned to have private providers complete financial audits similar to the ones done by DSN providers. A vote was taken and the motion passed by unanimous vote. Dr. Buscemi requested guidance from the Commission as to what direction she should go in regarding provider oversight.

Discussion followed. Dr. Buscemi said she wants to proceed so there will be a meaningful result. Discussion turned to direct billing. Dr. Buscemi stated DDSN cannot proceed with direct billing due to the blended rate structure, that it would have to be broken out by DHHS.

DDSN Implementation of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

Mrs. Beck spoke of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA). She stated it is a landmark legislation that is designed to strengthen and improve the nation's public workforce system and explained in detail the implementation of WIOA. She stated how one of the Rules contains new requirements that are quite complicated and have steep penalties for not meeting the requirements. To provide guidance and technical assistance, to DDSN staff developed a summary matrix to clarify for providers the requirements and necessary steps to reach compliance. The US Department of Labor's technical assistance contractor, Workforce Innovation Technical Assistance Center (WINTAC) confirmed its accuracy and asked if they could post it on their website for use by others throughout the country. A press release was requested by Chairman Danielson and will be disseminated once this posting has taken place by WINTAC. (Attachment B)

Waiting List Reduction Efforts

Mrs. Beck presented information on the Waiting List Reduction Efforts. Dr. Buscemi stated there will be an increase in movement once the ID/RD Waiver is approved and added that the waiver will be managed differently. Discussion followed regarding moving individuals from the critical list. (Attachment C)

Consideration of Bid

Mr. Waring presented information for Commission approval on replacing the Energy Management Controls System at the Regional Centers. On motion of Commissioner Thompson, seconded and passed, the Commission approved to award the contract to Schneider Electric of Charlotte, NC in the amount of \$165,137.40 with the permission to award to the second low bidder should the low bidder be determined non-responsible. (Attachment D)

Financial Reports

Mr. Waring gave an overview of the agency's financial activity through November 30, 2016 and the agency's current financial position. The agency's operating cash balance as of November 30, 2016 is \$128,460,615. Also, a SCEIS report reflecting budget verses actual expenditures through November 2016 was provided. (Attachment E)





The current system hardware and software is outdated and unsupported. Existing equipment controllers and device monitors shall remain in service or shall be replaced as required. The energy management controls system monitors hot water temperatures to insure the health and safety of consumers; initiates and monitors the weekly exercise of emergency generators to insure readiness; and controls building heating, air conditioning, ventilation, and humidity to provide comfort and healthy environment when buildings are occupied, as well as providing setbacks for energy efficiency when buildings are unoccupied. The primary web server will be located at Central Office.

It is recommended that a contract be awarded to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, SCHNEIDER ELECTRIC of CHARLOTTE, NC in the amount of \$165,137.40. While no problem is anticipated, permission is requested to award to the second low bidder should the low bidder be determined non-responsible.
